Honoring African American Physicians:

Pioneers in Medicine and Society By Dr. Christopher Brown, MD, MPH

As we celebrate Black History Month, let's recognize the extraordinary contributions

of African American physicians who have shaped the landscape of medicine and society in America.

Dr. James McCune Smith (1813-1865)

Dr. Smith broke barriers as the first African American to earn a medical degree in 1837. He was a pioneering intellectual who used his medical expertise to challenge racist pseudoscience of his time. His work in medicine and his writings on race and society laid the groundwork for future civil rights movements.

Dr. Rebecca Lee Crumpler (1831-1895)

In 1864, Dr. Crumpler became the first African American woman to earn a medical degree in the United States. After the Civil War, she dedicated herself to providing medical care to former slaves in the South, facing significant discrimination but persevering to help those most in need.

Dr. Charles Drew (1904-1950)

Known as the "Father of Blood Banking," Dr. Drew revolutionized blood preservation techniques in the 1940s. His research on plasma and blood storage saved countless lives during World War II and continues to impact modern medicine. Dr. Drew also fought against racial segregation in the medical profession.

Dr. Marilyn Hughes Gaston (1939-present)

Dr. Gaston's groundbreaking research on sickle cell disease in the 1980s led to a national screening program for newborns. Her work significantly improved the lives of many African American children affected by this condition. She became the first African American woman to direct a public health service bureau.

Dr. Ben Carson (1951-present)

A renowned neurosurgeon, Dr. Carson is known for his work in pediatric neurosurgery. He performed groundbreaking operations, including the first successful separation of conjoined twins joined at the back of the head. His career has inspired many young African Americans to pursue careers in medicine.

These physicians have not only advanced medical science but also paved the way for greater diversity and inclusion in healthcare. Their stories of perseverance, innovation, and dedication continue to inspire new generations of medical professionals. As we reflect on their legacies, let us be motivated to pursue excellence in our own fields and work towards positive change in our communities. 

Black History Month

Augustine of Hippo By Rev. Landon Adams, Director of Maturity

Augustine of Hippo was born in Thagaste, Numidia, a Roman-Berber province in

North Africa -present day Algeria. His mother, Monica, a devoted Christian prayed constantly for her son. These were much needed prayers, because Augustine scorned Christian doctrine and scriptures, lived a notorious lifestyle and followed the teachings of the heretical Manicheans, a group who distorted Christian teachings and rejected the Old Testament. The prayers of his mother were answered when Augustine heard the preaching of Saint Ambrose of Milan. Augustine accepted Jesus, was baptized, became a priest and later a bishop. Augustine, one of the most famous and influential theologians and writers of Western Christianity, was a strong supporter of the poor and a defender of orthodox Christianity. His autobiographical work, Confessions, provides inspiration to those striving to live a virtuous life. Augustine's writings describe our dependency on God for the grace to live a holy life, and express our human longing for God. The restlessness in the human heart that longs for God, represented by a flaming heart pierced by an arrow is seen in Vernon Adams, Jr's painting – "An Unlikely Aquilegia". The flaming heart is the human heart on fire with passion for God, humanity and this gift of life. The arrow piercing the heart represents the Spirit of God, piercing our hearts, calling us to continued growth in faith, hope and love.
