

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Health Corner

From Midwives to Medical Pioneers: The Legacy of African American Women in Maternal Health

Throughout history, African American women have played a crucial role in maternal health. From the days of slavery to modern times, they have been at the forefront of caring for mothers and babies, often in the face of great challenges.

The Legacy of Midwives

African American midwives, often called "granny midwives," were essential in their communities. They provided care when hospitals were segregated or too far away. These brave women used their skills and knowledge passed down through generations to help mothers safely deliver their babies.

Just like the Hebrew midwives in the Bible who saved babies despite Pharaoh's orders, these midwives stood up for what was right. They fought for the health and dignity of mothers and babies, even when it wasn't easy.

Modern-Day Medical Pioneers

Today, African American women continue to lead in maternal health. Dr. Joia Crear-Perry, founder of the National Birth Equity Collaborative, works tirelessly to improve Black maternal health outcomes. She fights against the unfair treatment that leads to higher death rates for Black mothers.

Another shining example is Dr. Helen O. Dickens, who became the first African American woman board-certified in obstetrics and gynecology in Philadelphia. She founded a health clinic for young mothers and worked hard to increase the number of minority students in medical school.

In our own community, Restoring Our Own Through Transformation (R.O.O.T.T.), founded by Jessica M. Roach, continues this legacy. This Black women-led organization offers doula support, education, and advocacy to improve maternal health outcomes. R.O.O.T.T.'s approach is grounded in Reproductive Justice, focusing on autonomy and trusting Black Women and Families.

Ongoing Challenges and Hope for the Future

Despite progress, Black women still face higher risks during pregnancy and childbirth. In 2023, the maternal mortality rate for Black women increased, highlighting the urgent need for change.

But there is hope. More African American women are becoming doctors, midwives, and health advocates. They're working to make sure all mothers get the care they deserve. By learning from the wisdom of the past and using modern medical knowledge, these women are creating a brighter future for maternal health.

As a community, we can support this important work. We can educate ourselves, advocate for better healthcare, and pray for the safety and well-being of all mothers and babies. Together, we can honor the legacy of those who came before us and build a healthier future for generations to come.
